

ST MARY'S RENOVATIONS:

A DAY WITH MARY:

is coming to St John's Cathedral, led by Father Serafino and Father Pio, on Saturday 13th October, from 9.45am to 5.15pm. A Day With Mary emphasises worship of the Blessed Sacrament and devotion to Our Lady. It includes Mass, the Rosary, Adoration and Benediction, Acts of Consecration, Confession, Enrolments in the Brown Scapular and the Miraculous Medal, and much more.

ISLE OF WIGHT RETREAT:

Father Serafino will be leading a three-day retreat at the Verbum Dei Centre (PO30 1YR) on the Isle of Wight from Friday 16th to Sunday 18th November. Our parish is blessed to have among its members a very gifted artist in Clare Fox, who has recently produced a truly magnificent painting of Our Lady with the Child Jesus. The image, entitled 'Mary, Mother of the Infant Saviour', which Clare has so kindly donated to the parish, is now on display in St Mary's Hall. Parishioners are warmly invited to come and view it for themselves, and it is hoped that all who see it will be inspired to a greater love for and devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary. We are very grateful to Clare for this beautiful gift.

PRO-LIFE APOSTOLATE:

Two things of note. First up, Sunday 7th October is the Annual Parish Pro-Life Pilgrimage to Walsingham, which, as usual, will depart at 6am from outside St Mary's Hall. Second, a big thankyou to all those who got involved in the SPUC Postcard Appeal and wrote to the Home Secretary, Sajid Javid, who has since announced before Parliament: "Having considered the evidence... I have reached the conclusion that introducing national buffer zones [around abortion clinics] would not be a proportionate response [to pro-life prayer vigils], considering the experiences of the majority of hospitals and clinics, and considering that the majority of [pro-life] activities are more passive in nature." This is a great victory for the pro-life movement and freedom of expression in this country. Thanks be to God.

ADORATION OUTREACH:

Every Thursday, between 1pm and 3pm, a group of parishioners go out onto the high street to invite passers-by into St Mary's to light a candle and spend some time in the presence of Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament. If you are available on Thursday afternoons, if only for half an hour or so, why not come along and take part?

DAY FOR CATECHISTS:

Led by the Diocesan Formation for Mission Team, the Day for Catechists takes place on Saturday 20th October in St John's Cathedral, from 10am to 4pm. "Friends Of The Cross"

Today's scriptures, like last Sunday's, highlight the idea of the importance of suffering for Christ. In today's Gospel, Jesus again tells His disciples that He will suffer: "The Son of man shall be betrayed into the hands of men, and they shall kill him; and after that he is killed, he shall rise again the third day." (Mk 9:30) In the First Reading, from the Book of Wisdom, we hear of all that the good Jews in Egypt would suffer at the hands of apostate Jews. These evildoers say, "Let us examine him by outrages and tortures, that we may know his meekness and try his patience." (Wis 2:19)

As we all know, there is much suffering in the world. God allows it for our purification. He also allows it because He has given man free will, and He will not oppose this. So, if some men wish to do evil, God will allow it for a time, but He will bring an even greater good from this evil. St James, in today's Second Reading, speaks of true wisdom, from which the value of suffering comes: "But the wisdom, that is from above, first indeed is chaste, then peaceable, modest, easy to be persuaded, consenting to the good, full of mercy and good fruits, without judging, without dissimulation." (Jas 3:17) Those who endure sufferings will be given the fruits of the Holy Ghost: "But the fruit of the Spirit is, charity, joy, peace, patience, benignity, goodness, longanimity, mildness, faith, modesty, continency, chastity. Against such there is no law. And they that are Christ's, have crucified their flesh, with the vices and concupiscences." (Gal 5:22-24)

For those who endure suffering and carry their crosses as Jesus taught His followers, they will enjoy these fruits of the Holy Ghost here on earth. These fruits are a foretaste of eternal glory for those who follow Christ and carry their crosses: "If any man will follow me, let him deny himself, and take up his cross, and follow me." (Mk 8:34)

Today, there are so many people who do not realise the great value of suffering in this life. People today try at all costs to get rid of their suffering and crosses. They fail to realise that God gives theses crosses to His friends to purify them; He also give them a chance to prove their love for Him by carrying their crosses. Crosses and suffering are, in reality, God's greatest gift to a soul. St Padre Pio said, "If we knew the value of suffering, we would beg for it." The saints all wanted to suffer for Christ to prove their love for Him. When we carry our cross, we help Jesus and prove our love for Him.

St Louis de Montfort wrote a treatise, Friends of the Cross, in which he showed the value of suffering and carrying one's cross each day: "Let him take up his cross, the one that is his. Let this man or this woman, rarely to be found and worth more than the entire world (Prov 31:10-31), take up with joy, fervently clasp in his arms and bravely set upon his shoulders this cross that is his own and not that of another; his own cross, the one that My Wisdom designed for him in every detail of number, weight and measurement; his own cross whose four dimensions, its length, breadth, thickness and height (Eph 3:18), I very accurately gauged with My own hands; his own cross which all out of love for him I carved from a section of the very Cross I bore on Calvary; his cross, the grandest of all the gifts I have for My chosen ones on earth; his Cross, made up in its thickness of temporal loss, humiliation, disdain, sorrow, illness and spiritual trial which My Providence will not fail to supply him with every day of his life; his cross, made up in its length of a definite period of days or months when he will have to bear with slander or be helplessly stretched out on a bed of pain, or forced to beg, or else a prey to temptation, dryness, desolation and many another mental anguish; his cross, made up in its breadth of hard and bitter situations stirred up for him by his relatives, friends or servants; his cross, finally, made up in its depth of secret sufferings which I will have him endure nor will I allow him any comfort from created beings, for by My order they will turn from him too and even join Me in making him suffer... Let him place it on his forehead and say with St Paul: 'God forbid that I should glory save in the Cross of Our Lord Jesus Christ.' (Gal 6:14)"

St Louis de Montfort continues to celebrate the value of the cross: "Let him carry it on his shoulders, after the example of Jesus Christ, and make it his weapon to victory and the sceptre of his empire (Is 9:16)... The cross: it is the cross he must carry for there is nothing more necessary, more useful, more agreeable and more glorious than suffering for Jesus Christ... Be glad, therefore, and rejoice when God favours you with one of His choicest crosses, for without realising it you are being blessed with the greatest gift that Heaven has, the greatest gift of God." Our Blessed Lord, in His Sermon on the Mount, blessed those who suffer in this life, for they will receive a very great reward in heaven: "Blessed are ye when they shall revile you, and persecute you, and speak all that is evil against you, untruly, for my sake: Be glad and rejoice, for your reward is very great in heaven." (Mt 5:11-12)
