

ST MARY'S RENOVATIONS:

ADORATION OUTREACH:

Every Thursday, between 1pm and 3pm, a group of parishioners go out onto the high street to invite passers-by into St Mary's to light a candle and spend some time in the presence of Our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament. FIRST FRIDAY & SATURDAY DEVOTIONS:

Next month's First Friday devotions take place at Sacred Heart Church in Fareham on Friday 3rd August, beginning at 9am with the Holy Rosary. Holy Mass follows, after which there is Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament until Benediction at 10.30am. During Adoration, there will be a meditation on the Resurrection of Jesus and Sacred Heart devotions. The Sacrament of Penance is available after Mass. Then, on Saturday 4th August, join us at St Mary's Church for First Saturday devotions, which begin with a sung Traditional Latin Mass at 9.30am, followed by Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, a meditation on the Carrying of the Cross, the Holy Rosary, and Immaculate Heart devotions. Confessions can be heard throughout the morning. After Benediction at 12 noon, the Marian Group will meet as usual in the Upper Room of St Mary's Hall for a shared lunch and a talk by one of the friars.

The Heavenly Banquet Of Eternal Life

In today's reading, we have the essential truth of God's care for His children. First, there is the Divine Providence that fulfils our bodily needs, and then there is the care that St Paul alludes to in our spiritual call from God. Earlier in his Epistle to the Ephesians, St Paul spoke of the great spiritual blessings that come to us through Jesus Christ: "Blessed be the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, who hath blessed us with spiritual blessings in heavenly places, in Christ: As he chose us in him before the foundation of the world, that we should be holy and unspotted in his sight in charity." (Eph 1:3-4) In today's Gospel, we have one of Jesus' most important miracles, the Multiplication of the Loaves and Fishes, by which He feeds five thousand men (not counting the women and children). Such a miracle made all the Jews exclaim that He was indeed the prophet who was to come: "Now those men, when they had seen what a miracle Jesus had done, said: This is of a truth the prophet, that is to come into the world." (Jn 6:14) Jesus, of course, is more than a prophet; He is the Son of God, who has come to give us heavenly food and life more abundantly in this life and eternal happiness hereafter.

We see in today's Gospel how the multitude of people had been following Jesus for three days. No doubt they had been given many miracles and believed that Jesus would perform even more for the sick and needy. Elsewhere in the scriptures, the evangelists said that Jesus healed all the sick placed before Him: "And all the multitude sought to touch him, for virtue went out from him, and healed all." (Lk 6:19) These were not just a few isolated healings; everyone was cured. We also learn from the other parts of the Gospel that the people were astonished at what Jesus did and said. This, of course, is why they follow Him; they are interested in what He can do for them.

Jesus looked at the great multitude of people who had been following Him for three days, and He had compassion on them. Jesus tells His disciples to have the men recline in grass in groups of fifty and He takes the loaves and fishes, which a boy had brought, and blesses them. He tells His disciples to distribute the food to the people. When all have eaten, He instructs His disciple to collect the fragments and they filled twelve baskets full of the leftover loaves and fishes. Never before had so many people been fed in this manner. True, in today's First Reading, the prophet Elisha multiplies food to feed a hundred men: "They shall eat, and there shall be left." (IV Kgs 4:43) We also know that God fed the Israelites in the desert for forty years. All this notwithstanding, God feeds the whole world every day with food grown with the aid of the land, water and sun. Who can comprehend the mysteries of God's creation?

Jesus knows this, and after the Multiplication of the Loaves and Fishes, He leaves the people who are more interested in what He could do for them, whether materially and politically (i.e. freedom from Roman oppression): "Now those men, when they had seen what a miracle Jesus had done, said: This is of a truth the prophet, that is to come into the world. Jesus therefore, when he knew that they would come to take him by force, and make him king, fled again into the mountain himself alone." (Jn 6:14-15) Jesus performed this great miracle primarily to remind the people of the true bread of heaven. The next day, after walking on water across the lake, He promises to give them this true bread: "I am the bread of life. Your fathers did eat manna in the desert, and are dead. This is the bread which cometh down from heaven; that if any man eat of it, he may not die. I am the living bread which came down from heaven. If any man eat of this bread, he shall live for ever; and the bread that I will give, is my flesh, for the life of the world." (In 6:48-52) Jesus wanted the Jews to realise that there was power in His words. That is why He performed this spectacular miracle for all to see! Certainly, if Jesus could cure all the sick, and multiply food for thousands and walk on water, then He could give His own flesh and blood to eat and drink. This is the spiritual food, just as His words "are spirit and life" (Jn 6:64): "Except you eat the flesh of the Son of man, and drink his blood, you shall not have life in you. He that eateth my flesh, and drinketh my blood, hath everlasting life: and I will raise him up in the last day." (Jn 6:54-55) Still, many of His own disciples did not believe: "Many therefore of his disciples, hearing it, said: This saying is hard, and who can hear it?" (Jn 6:61-62)

Let us say with St Paul, as we see in today's Second Reading: "I therefore, a prisoner in the Lord, beseech you that you walk worthy of the vocation in which you are called." (Eph 4:1) We, like the multitude, have followed Jesus and have been called to the Catholic Church. We are living, as it were, in the world in preparation for the heavenly banquet where we will feast every day by seeing God, the Most Holy Trinity – Father, Son and Holy Spirit – "face to face." (II Jn 1:12) We have been fed on the Body and Blood, Soul and Divinity of our spouse, Jesus Christ, during this life as a preparation for the heavenly food. Our heavenly Father cares for us as Jesus cared for the multitude that followed Him into the desert. The promise of the Eucharist in today's Gospel is a foretaste of this heavenly banquet which will be ours for all eternity. Let us adore God in the Holy Eucharist now as a preparation for our eternal happiness in the marriage feast of heaven.
