

ST MARY'S RENOVATIONS:

PARISH FILM NIGHT:

Our next parish film night will be on Friday 25th May, beginning at 7.30pm in St Mary's Hall. The film is "Siege Lord II: Day of the Siege", an historical epic about the 1683 Battle of Vienna, in which the armies of the Holy Roman Empire fought to defend Christian Europe against a massive Ottoman invasion force.

PARISH WALKING PILGRIMAGE:

Over the weekend of 18th/19th August, Father Pio will be leading a pilgrimage along the Way of Saint Augustine, a path that runs from Canterbury Cathedral to the Shrine of St Augustine in Ramsgate, to commemorate the ancient journey undertaken by St Augustine, the Apostle of England, in the 6th Century, when he was sent by Pope Gregory the Great to bring the Faith to England. The walk is around 19 miles long, along which we will recite the Holy Rosary, sing hymns and have the chance to speak with others. Then, on arriving at the Shrine of St Augustine, the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass will be offered. This pilgrimage is open to all who are able to maintain a good walking pace over the required distance. ADORATION OUTREACH:



The Begotten Of God

In His Last Supper discourse, Jesus told His disciples, "I will not leave you orphans, I will come to you." (Jn 14:18) They would not be orphans after Jesus' Ascension into heaven. In today's Gospel, Jesus prays to the Father that all His apostles will be kept in the Father's name and be one with Him and the Father: "And now I am not in the world, and these are in the world, and I come to thee. Holy Father, keep them in thy name whom thou has given me; that they may be one, as we also are." (Jn 17:11) Jesus will not leave His followers as orphans; He has sacrificed His life for them, and they are one with Him and the Father.

Throughout this Last Supper discourse, which is Jesus' "Last Will and Testament" to His apostles and disciples, Jesus seeks to impart joy: "These things I have spoken to you, that my joy may be in you, and your joy may be filled." (Jn 15:11) This joy is only possible if we keep His Commandments: "If you keep my commandments, you shall abide in my love; as I also have kept my Father's commandments, and do abide in his love." (Jn 15:10) If Jesus abides in us, we will be filled with His sanctifying grace and His virtues. St John tells us in today's Epistle that we will be filled with Jesus' love for one another because He is love itself: "...for God is charity (love)... My dearest, if God hath so loved us; we also ought to love one another." (I Jn 4:8-11) By loving our neighbour, we become begotten children of God, who abides in us: "If we love one another, God abideth in us, and his charity is perfected in us." (I Jn 4:12)

The great American playwright Eugene O'Neill, who was a Catholic, wrote A Moon for the Misbegotten, a sequel to his autobiographical play, Long Day's Journey into Night. In the former play he depicts several characters who are without love for God and neighbour. They are misbegotten souls who plot and scheme to overcome their human condition. Jim Tyrone, the protagonist, is incapable of love, constantly haunted and tormented by guilt over his mother's death after her life-long addiction to morphine. He is typical of the many in this world who are without joy and love, which can only be given to us by God's grace. So many souls who live disjointed lives without God believe that one religion is as good as another. They do not love God, nor keep His Commandments! When the effects of sin occur in their lives, they become depressed and without any hope. It is for these lost souls that Jesus prays in today's Gospel: "And now I am not in the world, and these are in the world, and I come to thee. Holy Father, keep them in thy name whom thou has given me; that they may be one, as we also are. While I was with them, I kept them in thy name. Those whom thou gavest me have I kept; and none of them is lost, but the son of perdition, that the scripture may be fulfilled." (Jn 17:11-12) Judas, "the son of perdition" who betrayed Jesus, was the only apostle who was lost. He was the misbegotten soul of whom Jesus commented, "...but woe to that man by whom the Son of man shall be betrayed: it were better for him, if that man had not been born." (Mt 26:24) Judas and all who fail to love God and their fellow man are the misbegotten souls for whom it would be better never to have been born.

Today's Gospel, from Jesus' Last Supper discourse, is a prayer for His apostles, who believe and follow Him. Jesus prays to His Father that they may have the same joy that is in Him and the Father: "And now I come to thee; and these things I speak in the world, that they may have my joy filled in themselves." (Jn 17:13) Jesus wants His apostles, and all those who believe in Him, to be kept from evil and sanctified in His truth: "I pray not that thou shouldst take them out of the world, but that thou shouldst keep them from evil. They are not of the world, as I also am not of the world. Sanctify them in truth. Thy word is truth." (Jn 17:15-17) All who believe in Jesus Christ and are baptised in the Holy Spirit are begotten in the love of Jesus Christ, and will be saved. Jesus had told Nicodemus that it was important to be born again (begotten) in order to enter the kingdom of heaven: "Amen, amen I say to thee, unless a man be born again of water and the Holy Ghost, he cannot enter into the kingdom of God." (Jn 3:5) Those who are "born again" (begotten) of the Holy Spirit are those who love God and their neighbour as Jesus commanded His followers. Those who did not keep the Commandments, who are lost in hell for all eternity, are the misbegotten souls who would have been better off not having been born.
